EDITORIAL

It was rather disturbing, not to say embarrassing, to find that the UK Top 20 lists which went out before the Spring Bank Holiday (and were thus used by journalists attending the CAU Championships at Leicester) omitted two very significant marks: namely the top performances at 800m (1:50.3 by David Herron) and women's 400m (54.5 by Jannette Roscoe). These were recorded well before the lists were duplicated so the question must be asked: "Why weren't these performances notified to Stan Greenberg and Liz Sissons?"

It does seem that members outside London should be doing more to find out what is happening in their respective areas. Remember that the Press and others are paying for this service so we do have a responsibility to provide the most accurate and up-to-date information as possible.

And it might be appropriate to mention here that all members are entitled to claim for postages incurred on NUTS work. Fully detailed statements should be submitted to the Hon Treasurer (Brian Nott) at the end of the season.

The attendance at the AGM on 15 July was almost certainly the lowest ever (see below) and the passing of the amendment to Rule 6(c) may ensure higher attendances in future. Next year, for instance, it seems that the best venue would be Edinburgh during the European Cup finals. Members who require a copy of the AGM minutes should contact the Hon Secretary (Andrew Huxtable). The reason for the complete lack of certainty about attendances at previous AGMs is due to the lack of minutes for the following years: 1961, 1962, 1963. Can any member provide a copy for retention in the NUTS archives?

NUTHOUSE: A VIEW FROM THE OTHER SIDE by D. Mousse (pseud)

NUTS or nuts have to be stored or kept somewhere, and having had the job of harbouring a nut for several years (It should be realised that this is a criminal offence and may carry a life sentence!-Ed) and feeling totally unqualified to write about the breed, I was naturally considered the best person to do so. NUTHATCH by Andrew Huxtable

The Asiatic elephant has the longest gestation period of any mammal with a recorded maximum of 2 years 1 month (Source: "Guinness Book of Records" 18th edition, with acknowledgments to Ross and Norris McWhirter). But the period required for me to develop into a nut was far longer - just over 10 years to be precise. I can date the conception (or, if you prefer, the moment my imagination was fired by athletics) to 1948. I was on holiday in Sussex during the Olympic Games and vividly recall reading a newspaper account of the 100m final. What may be even more startling is that (as a 9 year old) I exploded across a beautifully green lawn to emulate Harrison Dillard (or was it Barney Ewell?) under the watchful hand (pun!) of my father.

The Olympic year of 1952 brought a renewed spurt of enthusiasm. I can remember rehashing as a "pin-up" a photo of Jean Desforges from "World Sports" and went to the White City for the first time to watch the CAU Championships. And it seems only yesterday that I was listening to the commentary by Harold Abrahams on the Olympic 5000m final with its pulsating ladt lap fight between Zátopek, Mimoun, Schade and Chataway. My biggest disappointment that year was the disqualification of Roland Hardy in the Olympic 10km track walk heats.

The next crucial stage of development occurred in 1954 when I purchased at the White City the May issue of "Athletics World": never had I read anything quite as brilliant as Norris McWhirter's account of the 3:59.4, and from then on made sure I saved enough pocket money each month to mail a postal order for what many of us still consider to be the best athletics magazine ever published.

Then, round about early June, an eagerly awaited copy of the "World Sports" (ATFS) International Athletics Annual plopped through my letter-box. Many a dull moment in a 5th form chemistry period was enlivened by the surreptitious reading (and attempt to memorise) the 1953 World List.

Perhaps the most important stimuli came at school, because on the staff were Harry Hathway (renowned as one of Britain's chief timekeepers and the leading theoretician) and John Peckham (a member of the SLH team which won the AAA 4x100m title in 1947); the former taught - not surprisingly - mathematics and the latter English literature. Added to which an Old Rutlishian, Derek Pugh, won the European 400m title in 1950.

I came into contact (only by letter though) with Mel Watman, Bob Sparks and Stan Greenberg in late 1957/early 1958. The NUTS was formed on 31 January 1958 and not long afterwards I met these young fanatics who were merely "names" up to that time. And, most exciting of all, I was invited to become a member of the organisation with a place on the Executive Committee.

So the birth of this nut (or "nuthatch") may be given as 18 September 1958, when I attended a committee meeting at which Alf Wilkins, Mel, Bob, Stan, Peter May, Pat Brian, Len Gebbett, Colin Young and Chris Lindsay were also present.
